

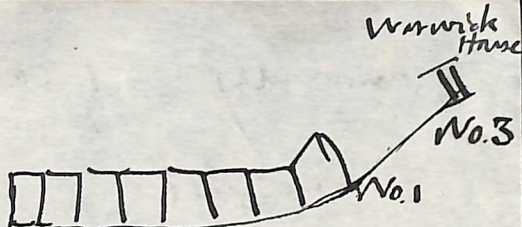
Thursday 1.30 p.m.

Early 1916

Dearest, I saw Clarke last night & he held out no hopes of my going to Lydd immediately; & I now expect to be here about a month. It seems fairly certain that I shall go on then.

So you'll be coming to-morrow — I'm not much use till about 4.30 — that's about the time I got back yesterday. If you come by 12.50 (arr 6.16) don't forget to change Basingstoke — the connection is 2.5 from Woking & it's a good journey from there. This house is in the block on the right near the Pavilion; I'll try to show it
