

## Magdalene College, Cambridge

As it is desirable that all members of the College should if possible after proceeding to their first degree become life members of the College and University, the College has decided to accept composition fees, in place of all annual payments, according to the graduated scale appended below.

It should be remembered that all Masters of Arts who have kept their names continuously on the books obtain the Parliamentary Franchise, a voice in the government of the University, and the right to borrow books from the University Library. In the case of a break in the continuity of membership these privileges can still be secured by payment of arrears of University Dues calculated at the rate of 17/- a year, the total amount of arrears in no instance to exceed £5 however long the interval.

It is thus to the advantage of members of the College to secure life memberships as soon as possible after their first degree, and the College hopes that those who have not done so will take advantage of the opportunity of compounding on favourable terms here offered them.

## PARLIAMENTARY FRANCHISE.

Every person who before the passing of the Representation of the People Act has received a degree from the University, is entitled to be placed on the Register of Electors for the University, provided that, if he was not previously entitled to vote for the University members, he makes a claim for the purpose.

A registration fee of £1 is charged to any person claiming to be placed on the Parliamentary Register who has received a degree before the passing of the act but was not entitled to vote in respect thereof; but the fee is not required of any person who has previously compounded for University dues; and if and when any person who has paid the registration fee compounds subsequently for University dues the sum of £1 shall be repaid to him.

## MEMBERSHIP OF THE SENATE.

In view of the altered conditions resulting from the Representation of the People Act and the change in the value of money, the University and Colleges have made considerable reductions in the fees for the M.A. degree and for Composition for Life Membership; and it is hoped that many Graduates whose membership has lapsed will now, at the same time as they claim to exercise their right to be placed on the Parliamentary Register for the University, also take the necessary steps to become Members of the Senate with a share in the government of the University.

In the case of persons who matriculated before the end of the Lent Term, 1915, the cost of obtaining Life Membership of the University and College is according to the following scale of composition fees inclusive of all sums payable for back dues or future capitation tax.

The payment of this composition fee in the case of a Master of Arts or Master of Laws will make him a member of the Senate for life, with the right to vote on all matters that come before the Senate and to borrow ten volumes at a time from the University Library.

The cost to a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Laws, who matriculated before the end of the Lent Term, 1915, of proceeding to the degree of M.A. or LL.M., will in future be as follows:—
