one is about I do wish she

a nuisance. I feel rather
depressed today because of
Warsaw it is evidently going
to fall and I suppose it will
make the war much longer
I wish they could hold it
The garden here is ever so
much better than the Roke
one, much more flowers

I do like thinking of you in
Wales among the bare biggness
of it all and I love getting your
letters they are such nice ones
I wish I could write you interesting
ones but you see I am simply
doing nothing to write about
Yesterday evening we had rather
an amusing chase trying to
get birds out of these fruit
gardens I think we got them all
in the end but they were
a job Their day June caught
