Friday

My dearest Ruth,

I'm going to write you a few lines
in bed as I clearly shan't have time to-morrow.
We shall be starting immediately after break-
fast by the coach to Brodick so as to get up
Glen Rosa to A Chur.

David and I
had a strenuous afternoon on a rather
insignificant rock face. We got up about
200 feet in four hours hard climbing - so
may imagine we met some difficulties -
in point of fact we were turned back
from likely looking places 10 times. I was
leading & was in quite good form; we
went up some stiff places.

My feet are much better this evening
though still tender & we aught to have
a good day to-morrow. It cleared up
beautifully this afternoon & all the

strange islands & tongues of land were
lying about in the sea like gems. The
glass has been going up very slightly all
day. Will went out in a boat this
afternoon & caught three mackerel, he
seems much cheered.

I had two letters from you today - thank
you. I'm greatly amused by Telli's offer
of 10/- for the use of the piano. I wrote
her up this morning to say I felt like
wringing that woman's neck.

I don't much expect I shall stay with
Arie even for a night - unless the weather
breaks here & I leave earlier than I intended.
I'm sorry you are left alone. But you
seem very cheerful.
