

[F 22 May 1914]

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My dearest George

This letter I am beginning on Friday evening it ought to be written on Saturday only it is possible that I may go up the mountain tomorrow in which case I should not have time to write at least not if we start before breakfast at you suggested, but I have not looked up the distance on the map yet.

I did not row the boat at all today because Father and Alison thought they could manage very well by themselves as the wind is light today. Margorie & Mildred & to a certain extent we have been discussing the wedding today and it seems generally decided that your clothes are much more difficult than mine. Mildred seems to think that white tennys flannels & scarlet sack would look the best, I still rather incline to brown corduroys. It is a shame to tease you about it, I won't say a word more today.

I have been looking at the photograph you sent me again. it is a jolly position but from the point of view of you it is a little unsatisfying. I do rather wish to go up those mountains. I wonder if I shall be any good and whether I shall enjoy myself as much as I feel I shall.

I have been writing an Italian letter to Signorina  
I think it as a very bad dull one but I had  
no dictionary which does make me rather limited.  
I still haven't heard from Mrs Davies I will tell  
you as soon as I can what she says.

Good night now dear I am afraid this will be  
an unsatisfactory one if I don't write any more  
to it. But if I don't the next one shall be a  
good long one
