Bob says you will very likely have had to post it by civilian post and that takes a long time now as they censor very strictly. You have gone such a long way away after being wonderfully close, it will bring you ~~bring you~~ closer when I get letters again. If only I can have the baby & feel that I have some of you within me all the time. I do love you you and wonder at you so, my dearest. I took your letter on religious education to Mary Anne for her to read & on the way I read it in the train again it is sometime since I have. I think I understood it better this time than I did when I first read it. I have got further and talked with you since. I do agree with it very much and I am

very glad to have it. Now that I have heard you & Raymond and Robert Graves talk about the war I understand much more than I did before what it is like and what those battles mean, and it filled me with wonder and awe to think that you should have been writing that on July 1. You are a very marvelous person dear.

Mary Anne liked it very much & thought it very wise, she too liked the prayer and says she means to remodel Jane Diana's prayers on those lines.

Its awfully interesting to me to find that she is in so much the same state about religion as I am. She has always prayed for definite things but has lately been trying not to do so so much & never to pray for anything definite at all unless as far as she can see on every side it is right that she should have it.

For instance she has been dreadfully troubled as you know by seorant difficulties &

she says that it really has been getting on her mind a lot and it old day she would have prayed that she might quickly obtain good servants; but now she says she feels it possible that it may not be right that she should have them & they may be more needed elsewhere so she only prays for strength to go through with what ever turns up. Now it seem all right to me at present to pray as difficult as that. I want to have a little daily prayer. As I was coming up the drive this evening I stood still with the darkness round me & thought of God & peace came to me. I wonder if that is the right sort of prayer, it makes me feel happy anyway. Mary Anne believes as firmly in a future life as I do. She also never looks upon her life here as one & her life there as possibly another but they are to her as to me one continuous whole & constantly thought of as such; and she finds any other idea impossible & unreasonable.

It is now Saturday morning & I am writing
in bed because I have woken up.

Yesterday was the warmest day we have had
for a long time, there was a blustering West
wind and misty rain. Mary Anne was not

Haslemere in her Aunt's carriage and we
drove to the house it was only about a
mile from the station then we stayed in doors
and talked ^{the rest} ~~most~~ of the morning. I saw
Diana at lunch time, she is an attractive

her brain enough rest and is too precocious.
I don't believe it will hurt her so long as
they avoid working her too hard later on.

After lunch we had a lovely walk up a valley

much for us to see any think so we come down another valley into ours.

We were talking about peace on our way back and she says she does not think that England ought to pretend she is ready to carry on the war for years if necessary, for one thing we are not ready to and for another we ought to be ready too. England ought to say definitely you must give back Belgium her territory & so much money, Serbia her territory & so much & Rumania the same & France & Alsace & Lorraine & for us we want certain of your high officials hung. I suppose the difficulty about it is our allies, many of them want things they wont get like Russia wanting Constantinople

Mary Anne says she is feeling better than she has felt for a long time now and she hopes to give up work in June & take a rest and then begin Patriotic, who is to be the little

son. I do hope she will get a little son
and not another girl it would be so
hard after saving for a boy.

Her father's death does not seem to have
made much difference to her in the
money way, her spent his last years
in silly speculation that ran away
with a lot of money.

I have had a letter from you this morning.
I am glad you had a quiet safe voyage, and very
glad you went to Winchester and heard music
in the Cathedral it must have been lovely.
I do love hearing music in beautiful places
Your letter made me imagine it very well.
I am sorry you lost your mist case I
hope will recapture it, but hunting round
rest camps sounds an awful job. I suppose
the rest camp means that you will have
to go by the slow military train.
