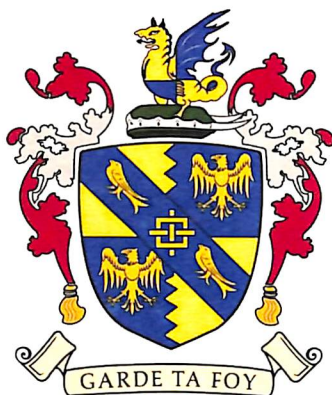

About the Benefactors' List

To qualify for inclusion in this short list, benefactors must have given gifts which could be defined as 'substantial' by the standards of this or their own day. They must also be dead.

The list is in two distinct parts. The first is concerned in particular with those who contributed to the foundation of the College and its 'bricks and mortar'. The second is more heterogeneous, and names those who bequeathed land, dwelling houses, or church livings, and endowed fellowships, scholarships, and prizes. In addition, it includes those who gave silver-plate to the College, such as James Chaloner (whose Chapel gift is traditionally displayed on the altar for this service), or presented books or manuscripts, notably Samuel Pepys, but also Dr Peckard, Dr Ladborough, and Professor I A Richards. In other cases, the College benefited from literary royalties, as it did for many years from A C Benson's 'Land of Hope and Glory', and continues to do from Robert Latham's edition of Pepys' Diary.

**THOSE WHO BEGAN, EXTENDED, AND IMPROVED THE COLLEGE
AND BUILDINGS, ESPECIALLY:**

John de Wisbech, Abbot of Crowland, who, enabled by Letters Patent obtained by his predecessor from King Henry the Sixth in 1428, began the building of this Chapel and other parts of First Court between 1470 and 1477 for the Benedictine Monks' Hostel, subsequently known as Buckingham College, after Anne Neville, 1st Duchess of Buckingham, and Henry Stafford, 2nd Duke of Buckingham, and Lord High Constable of England.

Edward Stafford, 3rd Duke of Buckingham, by whose aid the College was greatly enlarged, and the Hall built in 1519.

Thomas, Baron Audley of Walden, Lord Chancellor of England, who in 1542 refounded the College under the name of St Mary Magdalene; John Hughes, Chaplain to Lord Audley, who guided and endowed the College.

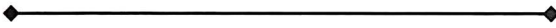
