Dearest One, There are thousands  
of things I want to tell you

1. We can go into Herschede House on Monday 29<sup>th</sup>. I have a Chamber Chb Committee on Friday the 27<sup>th</sup> & cannot get down before that night as Grange will be away. I hope to arrange for the furniture to be cleared (after 2 or 3 days packing etc) from the Holt on the Saturday morning at latest & a job van in the vans so that it will be here on the Monday. The only question

is whether I should be there for the packing  
in which case we might put off & I could  
perhaps stay Monday. I shall be very sorry  
not to be there particularly for the fasten-  
but I doubt if it's worth while & if I bring  
the car we can still take a few plants if  
I think of any you haven't taken.

2. I'm afraid you will think I have only  
concerned the issue of getting more paper  
from Teffrei. They now have a new book.  
But - though 10 days have to be allowed  
to get all their things, we shall have  
that time to decide about the hall  
etc. & we must now wait and do it  
on the spot — be sure to have all  
the paper patterns together for that  
purpose.

3. I saw Uncle Lawrence & arranged<sup>2</sup>  
not to have the mantle piece at  
present - we must see what we can  
do with paint etc. Meanwhile I  
might get a chance of looking at  
tiles. I have an address from L.A.T.  
of a firm who supply Dutch tiles one  
but I want the one your father tells  
us of - which I can't find - have  
you it? - if not will you get it  
from him again or I will. There's  
no hurry about the tiles.

4. I will try & make out a list of plants  
I can think of - for your guidance -  
will you inform Westbrook when  
we shall want the stuff from there. My

impression is that we shall want all  
we can get from anywhere - what about  
France? Aren't I greedy?

5. The sale at Herschel House is on  
Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> - in a tent in the garden.  
There is so little from the house that it  
won't interfere with our moving in -  
but much else is included & some  
may be of use to us.
6. I'm not at all sure we hadn't better  
go to the Allists until that is over.
7. There will certainly be good new beds  
in the sale - I don't think your  
bargain with Marshby is a good one con-  
sidering it means an extra mattress.  
However I had better leave the matter

of bed entirely in your hands & you must just do the best you can.

8. Will you go carefully into the matter of fixtures in the Holt - e.g. what electric light fittings we can take. It would probably be best to get a man up & answer etc - but I will let you know about that point ; and not only ~~and~~ staircase rods but their sockets ; and ? curtain rods - I will talk with Alex. Turner & ask their advice.
9. Curtains - let us wait now & decide any others on the spot - I incline to the new zigzag stuff for the study - it is pretty good.

10. Sealing-wax paint can't be used -  
it is complicated in various ways -  
but I suppose we might get the  
colours without using sealing-wax.

L.A.T. thought we should probably  
get too much of it unless we used  
gold with it (cheap gold paint); but  
if it is to be worked on could you do  
a design in a single colour white or  
yellow or umber on the doors & some  
simple affair on the staircase? If not  
I wonder if we hadn't better aim at  
something altogether different - I'm  
very fond of brown stain again if  
it can be managed.

Do think a lot about the staircase -  
as we are not going to spend money

on the drawing room marble piece we  
can afford a bit more. I shall have  
one more pattern from Jeffries & good  
blue & green on white ground rather  
expensive; & anyway we could use the  
dark garden for the Hall if you like.  
It's more important to keep that light  
than the staircase - hence ? cream  
doors!

A very tiring drive ~~top~~ back last night  
with a lot of mist. The class quite  
good but no improvement in numbers.  
A big committee on Tuesday, but good  
work done. Jarrow won't turn up  
- he is angry about turning down Finch.

Quite blind! Many stories about Finch  
- Bruce in a hotel in Switzerland  
where Finch had been was asked whether  
it was he who was helping Finch to  
arrange the next expedition.

Contradict that talk about shortage of  
funds - we don't want that sort of
