Wednesday.

My dearest Ruth, Yesterday was so full in the latter end that I failed to write to you - but I wouldn't be surprised if this arrives as soon as one from Skipper's would have done. A great expedition was made yesterday to a rather distant glen which was famous for an unclimbed pitch. The rappelling of him was a long - ingenious exploit, it had one smooth overhanging wall & one smooth perpendicular one - we held on either - a deep pool at the head of which was an easy chimney ; we began by heaving large stones into a shallower part of the pool & eventually I was able to carry my load across in a more or less horizontal position - but that way didn't do for the others & Mary Anne then invented the wonderfully

Bright thought of draining the pool; by
this means & by throwing in many more stones
we did the trick.

This morn'g Frances & I set out at 5:00
a.m. in the pony trap to catch the 8:30
steamer from Cassiar, 16 miles away. A
wonderful expedition over an old packhorse
track converted into a road. I proved
a veritable John & got me there in the
end with five minutes to spare! I suppose
she has taken the rest of the day getting back.

I had a most lovely walk over two
of the best mountains & saw quite a bit.
They are real mountains with rocky tops
- the ridges everywhere are splendid; yes to-
day when it was beautifully clear they
looked simply lovely from Steepner. There
are any number of small steep rock faces.
I had a very good climb up one - it took
about an hour & a half, - these were some

quite sensational bits. The noble behaved
excellently & I felt very safe. It is fun to
get out Grönkåle again. Will & David
were to meet me on top of Cir Mor but
I didn't find them there (I hadn't told
you that W. made an 11th hour plan to join
us did I?). I went down to the extremely
attractive 'Gable' which is the col between
Glen Rosa up from Broadick & Glen Samnox
up from Samnox; but as I saw no signs of
them & heard no answer to my shouts I had
quite given them up & was picking out my
path down through my glass when suddenly
I heard someone calling from I don't know
where. Eventually I saw them on the summit
of one of the mountains above Corrie - they
were far above me & I didn't attempt
to join them, but made my way down the
glen & after a brief bathe in a granite
pool got in for the start 5 mins before

to come just at the time when I shall be
coming back & Mary will be coming. Has
she found Jerry? Mary Ann is practically
catty certain that another baby is coming.
I shall never tell you half the things I have
to say till I get back again
