get so very much talk with her as I was
baking after the children this afternoon but I
did not mind that very much.

Marguerite Waterhouse is coming tomorrow for
the week end, we only heard this morning
and we are all so pleased. She does not
know yet whether she is going back to
France or not but she hopes not & so do
we. I feel almost mean & selfish in that I
can see all these nice people while you my
own dear have to stay out in France.
I heard nothing from the prospective work by
the morning no post so I sent a reply
back wire this afternoon asking her to come

to morrow and she has answered that she will come at 11.0 so that is good. This evening I had a letter from her saying she was staying on in her place till Friday so it is not want of keenness that prevented her coming.

I am glad Brother Giles is all right and in a cushy place, I wonder when he will get home.

I will try & see the Heanis or I would have only I have had a letter from him today saying that they are going to London or Wednesday for four weeks. Its rather a miserable letter, I shall answer it awfully nicely and tell him we are coming back in early January, or any way that I am and the babes. He is unhappy because he has written two letters to Jilly and had no reply, he wants to see her & play with her. I think I had better follow your lead and say nothing to her about him if I met her. She can't know all the people who

would like to know her.

I am glad the people at your battery were glad to have you back its so awfully nice to feel welcomed I think its one of the things. You will be welcomed when you get back to England, not only by me but by so many other people. However long it gets put off it will still be just as utterly lovely when it comes I am just going to leave this open to put till you anything that Mr Irvine may say if he does telephone.

Mrs Hannie Irvine telephoned and said that as far as Mr Irvine knew the only thing this Colonel Earl said was that the Labour ~~bureau~~ ~~bureau~~ was coming between the head master's application and the War Office.
