Mildred and Marjorie came back from London by the 6.40, she has got a very pretty ~~see~~ ring but I am afraid it was rather a disappointment to Bob because he wanted it to cost 20 or 30 pounds & it only cost £5. Mill is having up very cheerfully so far.

I have finished my plate this morning except the underneath pattern, but a good many plates have not got them yet. I must next try & design a new centre for the last of the set I'm not so cross now, writing to you has made me

feel better. The part of Old Wives tales that I have
been reading lately has been very enthralling I am
quite looking forward to reading some more
It is a queer book & very long but I like it
being long and dont want to finish

I do want another letter from you, reading old
ones is it the same. I suppose you are by yourself
now. I wish letters didnt take so long I want
to know exactly what you are doing. Its now
Thursday & I have not had an answer to the one I
wrote you on Sunday I am not the least surprised
as it had to go to Birkenhead first but still it
is a long time.

Good bye darling I do hope you are enjoying
yourself. I am really quite all right and happy
only I think I get physically bored & depressed
some times, for I have really plenty to think about
and do
